OUT AND ABOUT EXCURSION Repatriation General Hospital Museum

Participants were provided with a fascinating view into the history of the hospital, with a combination of historical medical equipment and memorabilia from a variety of wartime conflicts. We also visited the Repatriation chapel, an ecumenical chapel catering for both Catholic and Protestant denominations with pew backs that can be switched to cater for services at either end of the building. The stained glass windows in this building were a highlight. Created by Cedar Prest, a local glass artist based in Aldinga, they depicted scenes such as compassion, vigilance, sacrifice, liberty and courage. A really enjoyable and informative visit with welcoming and very helpful guides.

After a bit of wordplay, the bulky Canastillo turned into Canasta – well sounding, easy to remember!

Morialta Geological Ramble

Monday 17 Oct 1:30pm-03:30pm

Discover some of the geological features of Morialta Conservation park. This is a gentle up- and-downhill walk of about 5km return.

There will be many stops along the way to look at features of the different rock types along the route. Learn about the ways in which the different rock types were formed and affect the shape of the valley as well as the surrounding vegetation. No previous knowledge of geology is needed to enable you to understand these features.

History on Thursday Talks Lunatic Asylums in Nineteenth Century Australia 1.30 - 3.00pm Thursday

20 October, 3 November, 17 November, 1 December



This course explores the background to the establishment of lunatic asylums, focusing especially on those in South Australia and rural Victoria. Aspects of architecture, treatment philosophy and care are examined. The course concludes with an analysis of why the asylum system was ultimately seen as a failure.

Tutor: Andrew Crowther is a retired Associate Professor. Andrew's PhD is in contemporary history and he has researched and published in a wide range of subjects and topics.

Tutor: David Kilner




