We are reading several 'classics' of science fiction this year. We started with Jules Verne's *Journey to the Centre of the Earth,* went on to H.G. Wells' *The Time Machine* then Aldous Huxley's *Brave New World,* a story of how technology goes mad in an attempt to create

happiness.In June we read *Earth Abides*, a brilliant portrayal about the reconstruction of society following a pandemic. We'll continue with Asimov's *I*, *Robot*, about the relationship between humans and very smart robots. Later we'll visit John Wyndham's *Kraken Awakes*, which tells us what life will be like as the ice caps melt and flood our cities. Followed by *Do Androids Dream of Electric Sheep* – more apocalypse and the book that gave us *Blade Runner*. These novels all have relevance to today's world, as we meet threatening new challenges. *David Kilner*



At Last – some good news about the environment!

At the end of Term 1 the U3A Inner North birds group combined with the TTG U3A bird group to visit Frahns Farm at Monarto, which is run by an organisation called Bio-R. The volunteer directors are ecologists and include Dr David Paton AM and his daughter Dr Fiona Paton. Bio-R also runs the Cygnet Park project on Kangaroo Island. There were 22 in our combined U3A group and David Paton led the tour.

Bio-R has been given permission to develop this 550 hectare piece of crown land which had been set aside by the government in the 1960's for the aborted Monarto development. The area had

previously been cleared for farming and much of the habitat for local birds and other wildlife had been destroyed. The idea is to replace vegetation and restore the landscape in order to create a suitably biodiverse environment to reestablish the birds and other forms of life in the area. All the latest scientific knowledge about water conservation, weed control and removal of pesticide chemicals in the soil is being applied here.



Plantings started in 2019 and we were impressed to hear that 800 to 1,000 volunteers come to help when they have planting days. We were also very impressed by what has been achieved so far. 250 hectares of habitat has already been reconstructed and it's looking good. Obviously this is a very long term project, and also a time-consuming and expensive one. Bio-R are always looking for volunteers and also for donations! And while we were in the area we had a spectacular sighting of a pair of red-capped robins. What a great day! *Pauline Kemp*
