University of SA lecturer, Mary Adam, took us on a tour of the night sky within the comfort of the planetarium dome and its lay back seating. Mary, with plenty of passion for the topic, explained the planetary movements and star constellations. Followed by the screening of a film "Capturing the Cosmos," also projected under the dome. This film explored some cutting-edge astronomical discoveries, focusing on Australian scientists using advanced and quite mind-boggling technologies to map the far reaches of the universe. It also studied galaxy formation and tried to unravel the great mysteries of dark matter and black holes.

After the session some event attendees enjoyed a long lunch in the Mawson Lakes Hotel having a general chit chat about almost every subject under the sun, including the planetarium visit.



HOUSTON.....there was NO problem landing on schedule at The [Australian Space Discovery Centre](#), ably organised and assisted by Cathy Birchmore



Nathan, aka "Major Tom" 'really made the grade' in delivering a wonderful presentation about his favourite topic, space! We were introduced to the James Webb Space Telescope {JWST}, an orbiting infrared observatory. One of the photographic images transmitted by JWST showed a small section of our night sky that they've determined holds about 7,000 galaxies. To put that into perspective, those 7,000 galaxies would fit into the size of a grain of sand!

Nathan delighted in answering the great questions put to him by members of our group. As Cathy thanked him for his informative and most interesting presentation, she shared her wish that Nathan could be cloned and placed in every primary school! He took that extremely well. So much amazing information to hear, see and interact with, makes the centre a 'must visit' when you are next in Adelaide, strolling down North Terrace.
